Copyright Reform

The European Parliament adopted the proposal for a new copyright directive, after more than two years of negotiations. The text was agreed by the co-legislators last month and includes the two controversial articles on the creation of a new right that will allow press publishers to claim remuneration for the online use of their publications (so called publishers' neighbouring right, article 11) and on the imposition of content monitoring measures on online platforms (so called value gap, article 13). The text now needs to be formally adopted by the Council, which is expected for 9 April. It will then be published on the Official Journal of the EU; Member States will have 24 months to transpose the new rules into their national legislation.

Emission Targets for Cars

The European Parliament adopted the proposal for a regulation on CO2 emission standards for new cars and vans in the EU for the period after 2020. The proposal includes a strengthened market surveillance system and measures to support cost-effective implementation of the CO2 targets. Following this approval by the Parliament, the Council will finalise the formal adoption. The new legislation will enter into force twenty days after publication in the EU Official Journal.

Plastics

The European Parliament adopted the proposal for a directive on the reduction of the impact of certain plastic products on the environment. In particular, the directive will introduce a ban on selected single-use plastic products

and will extend producer responsibility schemes. The Council can now finalise the formal adoption of the text, which will then be published in the EU Official Journal. Member States will have two years to transpose the legislation into their national law.

Electricity Market Design

The European Parliament adopted new market design rules, which aim at making the EU's electricity market fit for the future. The Council can now formally adopt the texts. The Regulations will enter into force immediately, while the Directive will have to be transposed into national law within 18 months.

Consumer Redress

The European Parliament adopted its position on the proposal for a directive on representative actions, which will repeal Directive 2009/22/EC. Inter-institutional negotiations on the proposal will start once the Council agrees its position. The proposal aims at creating a harmonised framework for consumer redress across the EU.

■ Consumer Protection

The Committee of Permanent Representatives of the Council approved the agreement reached between the Presidency of the Council and the negotiator of the European Parliament on the proposal for the protection of consumers' interests. The proposal will amend the unfair commercial practices directive, the consumer rights directive, the unfair contract terms directive and the price indication directive. The text needs now to be formally adopted by the European Parliament and the Council. Member States will then have 24 months to transpose it into national law.

Cross-border Mobility of Companies

The Committee of Permanent Representatives of the Council endorsed the agreement reached between the Presidency of the Council and the negotiator of the European Parliament on 13 March on the draft directive on cross-border conversions, mergers and divisions. The text needs to be formally adopted by the two co-legislators. It will start applying 36 months after its entry into force.

Brexit

The European Institutions are finalising their preparations for a no-deal scenario. 17 out of the 19 legislative proposals presented by the European Commission have already been agreed by the co-legislators. The no-deal contingency plan includes measures for the EU budget, financial services, air connectivity and safety, road and rail connectivity, fishing rights, climate policy, social security entitlements and visa reciprocity. If the Withdrawal Agreement is not ratified by 29 March, a no-deal may occur on 12 April.

■ Non-performing Loans

The Committee of Permanent Representatives of the Council approved Member States' position on the proposed directive on secondary markets for bad loans. The co-legislators will start negotiations on the text as soon as the European Parliament agrees on its position.

■ Type-approval Requirements for Motor Vehicles

The Council and the European Parliament reached a provisional political agreement on the revised General Safety Regulation. According to the agreed text, as of 2022 new safety technologies for cars, vans, buses and trucks will become mandatory in European vehicles with the aim to protect passengers, pedestrians and cyclists. The agreement now needs to be formally approved by the co-legislators.

Cyper-security of 5G Networks

The EC published its recommendation for a common European approach to the security of 5G networks. The document contains a set of measures, in particular Member States are invited to complete by the end of June their national risk assessments; while by the end of the year the NIS Cooperation Group is expected to agree on the measures necessary to address the risk at EU levels. By October 2020, the Commission together with Member States shall assess the effect of the recommendation and if necessary present further actions.
